Drivers will this morning be on the route of the KCB Kajiado Rally to make sure their pace notes are in order in readiness for real action tomorrow.

Reconnaissance of any national rally allows drivers to visit the stages of the entire competition 48 hours before the actual start of the competition. Drivers are also restricted to a maximum of two visits per stage to be done at speed limits not exceeding 80kph.

Meanwhile, Jaspreet Chatthe says there is

no pressure on him as prepares for another onslaught on the 2015 KCB Kenya National Rally Championship with the Kajiado Rally this Saturday.

"All eyes will be on me with veterans like Ian Duncan, Baldev Chager and Carlo Tundo trying to dislodge me but that does not worry me at all. I am well prepared and set to continue with the same commitment and focus," said Chatthe, who is seeded

second out of a crew of 50.

followed by another commendable feat in the South African round of the African Rally Championship where he won the FIA-sanctioned class by virtue of finishing sixth overall.

Chatthe added: "The only difference in the Kajiado Rally will be a change of navigator and type of the pace notes. Spain's Craig Thorley, who navigated me in South Africa will take over from Guru Panesar for this particular rally to give me more training and knowledge on the pace notes with number system, which is also new to me. My commitment and focus remains the same."
